Dialysis care on wheels to hit the Gold Coast

- The Palaszczuk Government has provided \$1.6 million in funding for a mobile kidney dialysis service on the Gold Coast.
- The Big Red Kidney Bus will be the first of its kind in Queensland and will bring haemodialysis treatment closer to home for patients mid-2023.
- Currently more than 80 per cent of Gold Coast dialysis patients travel to hospital three times a week to receive treatment.

Gold Coasters with chronic kidney disease will soon have access to dialysis treatment closer to home thanks to \$1.6 million in Palaszczuk Government funding.

The Big Red Kidney Bus will be equipped with three haemodialysis spaces and start travelling throughout the Gold Coast in mid-2023.

This 18-month pilot program between Queensland Health and Kidney Health Australia will provide more accessible treatment and teach patients how to carry out dialysis at home.

The service will be the first of its kind in the state, easing the burden for the more than 80 per cent of Gold Coast patients who travel to hospital multiple times a week to receive treatment.

Tourists with chronic kidney disease will also be able to access the service, eliminating treatment barriers that often make travelling prohibitive.

Robina Lions Club strongly advocated for the service and raised \$300,000 to equip the Big Red Kidney Bus with an access ramp and dialysis equipment.

Haemodialysis is a process in which a machine acts as the kidneys and cleans the blood. It requires a cannula, a small tube, into a vein and can take four to five hours each treatment.
